Back to School Safety

The Oxford Community Police Service would like to remind everyone that September is exciting! It is back to School Time! Following are some reminders to ensure this is a safe and fun time of year:

- Take the time to show your youngster how to cross the street safely.
- Drop off children at schoolyards only during the times when they are supervised.
- Never leave children unsupervised in the schoolyard. Some predators wait for this opportunity.
- Can your son or daughter tell the difference between a good stranger and a bad stranger? If their answer is yes, they are probably wrong.
- Get acquainted with your child's bus driver.

- Don't assume drivers can see you. Make sure they can.
- Do not pass the school bus when the lights are flashing.
- Riding the bus is a privilege take every opportunity to reinforce bus safety rules with your child.
- School is in. Drive with caution. Guilt is a life sentence!
- Remind yourself that stopping for a school bus, crossing guard, young pedestrian and cyclist does not make you late. It keeps them safe.
- Get the details! Get license plate numbers!
- If you are ever approached by someone and you feel afraid, call 911.

New Traffic Regulation By-law

Recently, a new comprehensive road and traffic regulation by-law was passed by Council. This by-law has some exciting new features that allows the Township to take a firm stance against dangerous, disrespectful behaviour on our roads. New provisions in the by-law deal with issues such as littering on the road, parking in a disabled person parking space and parking in a Fire Route.

Not only does this by-law address present day safety concerns, it also creates the foundation for the Township to address future roads needs, including crosswalks, community safety zones and on-street disabled person parking.

Some people may be surprised by the increase in set fines; however, this increase was necessary to reflect modern rates. Since 1989, the fines in the Township have remained at \$8.00 for most offences. The increase in set fines will send a clear message to those who would forsake the laws of this Township. Through deterrence and action it can be demonstrated that the Township and its citizens are committed to the promotion of safe roads.

Highlights of New Fines:

Parking in a Fire Route...\$300

Parking over the time limit\$50

Littering.....\$50

Stopping in a "No Stopping" Area......\$50

Illegally parked or stopped in a designated disabled person parking area.....\$300

Parked illegally in a Snow Route.....\$50

Parking where prohibited by a sign.......\$50

Driving across a road ditch\$50

Pushing snow or ice on or across a highway.....\$50

Unauthorized removal, cutting or injury of a tree on a highway.......\$50

Chemical Emergency

A chemical emergency can happen anywhere – on a highway, in a factory, on a farm or at some other location in our community.

You may be asked to evacuate. Listen for instructions from your local emergency response officials.

You may be asked to "Shelter in Place". This means to go or remain indoors during the release of an airborne hazardous material, as opposed to evacuating the area. Remember the term "Shelter in Place". It may reduce your chances of long term health problems.

IF YOU ARE OUTDOORS

- Move out of the path of smoke or fumes to seek shelter indoors. DO NOT attempt to go through smoke or fumes.
- Seek shelter in a house or building and remain indoors. If an automobile is your only shelter, use it. Sheltering in place can reduce your exposure to that of outdoors.
- Do not get in your car and attempt to evacuate unless instructed to do so by the municipal authority. In the short term, staying indoors with the house closed up is the most effective action you can take.

WHEN YOU ARE INDOORS (Shelter in Place)

- Close all doors and windows.
- Stay calm and assemble all people and pets at the agreed upon meeting place in your home. Avoid going to the basement in a chemical incident.
- Do not get in your car and attempt to

evacuate unless instructed to do so by the municipal authority. In the short term, staying indoors with the house closed up is the most effective action you can take

• Turn your radio on to one of the local radio stations and monitor it.

- Set thermostats so air conditioners, furnaces and hot water heaters will not come on.
- Wet several towels and place them at the base of doors leading to the outside.
- Moisten more towels and use them over your nose and mouth to help filter some of the air you breathe.
- Close fireplace dampers.
- If your children are in school or daycare, do not attempt to bring them home.
 School children and officials should shelter in place unless told to do otherwise.
- Stay away from the emergency area. If you see or hear of a chemical accident, avoid the area as you may hinder emergency rescue and recovery efforts, at the same time putting yourself into harms way.
- Avoid calling 9-1-1 unless it is to report an emergency. To get information about the incident tune in to your local radio/ television stations.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q. What is being done about the July 16th flood in Tavistock?

A. The Township and County have engaged RJ Burnside Engineering from Stratford to investigate what happened during the July 16th storm in Tavistock. The first phase of this investigation involves gathering as much information as possible and reviewing the data available from past storm events in Tavistock. On July 29, 2005 an Open House was held at the Tavistock Memorial Hall. Representatives from the Township, County and RJ Burnside were present to listen to residents' individual questions and concerns. This Open House also facilitated the submission of questionnaires about the storm. If you have information about the storm event, irregardless if there was damage to your property, you are encouraged to submit a questionnaire. The questionnaire is available on the Township's website or a copy can be obtained by calling the Township office. Sewer connections can be complicated and depending on your unique circumstances, it may be best to obtain professional advice about the best course of action for your property. The County and Township are currently investigating options to provide assistance to residents in this regard.

Q. Is there a Township Landfill?

A. No, the Township does not operate its own landfill. Residents may use the Oxford County Landfill located east of the village of Salford on Salford Road (County Road 46). For current hours of operation, fees or other inquires, you may contact the Landfill at 519-485-1516 or visit the County's Website at:

- Q. When is the deadline for Innerkip Water Hook Ups?
- A. The deadline is July 1st, 2006; however, it is prudent to complete water service connections sooner rather than later.
- Q. Who is responsible for maintaining the civic address sign at my property?
- A. The civic address sign (911 Number) is to be maintained by the property owner. Replacement signs and parts can be purchased from the Township if required.
