# Barbecue Safety

**Barbecue season is here!** Here are a few tips to ensure a cleaner, safer barbecue that cooks great food.

## Inspect your Barbecue....

This should be done at the beginning of the season and anytime you need to change the propane tank.

- ◆ Spray soapy water on the connections and supply lines. If you see bubbles, turn off the tank and try re-connecting. If it still bubbles, then gas is still leaking. Shut off the tank and replace the leaky parts.
- ◆ Time to trade your propane cylinder? Propane tanks must be inspected and re-qualified or replaced every 10 years in Canada. A date stamp on the collar of the cylinder indicates when it was last qualified. Even if your tank is not at the 10 year limitation, it should be inspected closely for any damage or rusting. Always store tanks outside in a well ventilated area.
- ◆ Remove the grates and lava rocks and check the burner. On inspection, if it visually looks good then fire it up and make sure there is an even flame throughout. If not, replace it. Most burners only last 1 or 2 seasons, depending on the quality of the BBQ and how much use it receives. Since the lava rocks are out, why not clean out all the ash and grease that's accumulated at the bottom of the barbecue. While you're cleaning, check for rust and any sign of deterioration.
- ◆ Don't forget to check and clean out the venturi tubes that deliver the gas to the burner. If they get plugged, the gas will get diverted elsewhere and could pose a hazard.

## When you Barbecue....

- ◆ Make sure the barbecue is **at least 5'** from the house or any other material that could catch fire.
- ◆ Only open your propane tank a 1/4 to 1/2 turn. That's all the gas your barbecue needs to operate and if you have a problem it's much easier to shut off.
- ◆ Unless you're keen on joining the space program, always open the barbecue lid prior to lighting it. If it doesn't fire up the first time you try it, shut it down and try again in 5 minutes.
- ◆ Stay with the barbecue until you're finished and the tank is turned off.
- ◆ Ensure the barbecue is in a safe place where kids and pets won't touch or bump into it.
- ◆ If you use a barbecue lighter, make sure you don't leave it lying around where the kids can access it. It won't take long for them to figure out how to use it.
- ◆ When you are finished, ensure the barbecue is shut off, as well as the propane tank.

## A few tips for Charcoal Grillers.....

- ◆ Never use gasoline to get the coals going. Instead, use charcoal lighting fluid.
- ◆ Let the lighter fluid soak into the coals for a minute or so before lighting it. That gives the explosive vapours a chance to dissipate.
- ◆ Stand back from the coals when you ignite them and make sure you didn't accidentally spill fluid on yourself or any of the surrounding area.
- ◆ Before you light the coals, make sure the lighter fluid is at a safe distance away from the fire.
- ◆ If the coals start to die out, don't spray lighter fluid on the hot coals - this could create explosive results.
- ◆ Always extinguish the coals when finished barbecuing. A safe way to do it - wearing oven mitts, take the coals out of the barbecue with tongs and submerge them in a metal pail of water.

## 2011 Township Budget

The 2011 Budget has been approved by Council. This year's Township tax levy is up 2%. When combined with the County and Education Levies, the increase for the average residential property owner works out to 1.61%. This amount can be highly variable depending on whether your assessment has changed from 2010.

The 2011 Budget maintains programs and services at a consistent level with prior years. Capital projects will be returning to more normal levels after a significant increase in 2009 & 2010 with the infrastructure stimulus programs.

The breakdown to the right gives an overview of where your tax dollars go and how the Township uses its share. More budget details can be found on the Township website.

For the residential property class, 42% of your tax dollars go to the County of Oxford, 38% are used by the Township and 20% are transferred to the School Boards.

## Profiling our OPP Officers

Staff Sergeant Tim Clark is the Oxford County OPP Operations Manager and second in command at the Detachment. Tim oversees the shift sergeants, ensures that investigations are carried out properly and plans strategies to combat different community problems involving such areas as crime, drugs or traffic that occur within the Detachment area.

Tim was born and raised in Oxford County, attending Glendale High School in Tillsonburg. He then went on to study Law and Security at Conestoga College. Tim worked with the Tillsonburg OPP Auxiliary Police for two years before being hired in 1986. His first posting was at Newcastle, east of Toronto before being transferred to Central Patricia, now known as the Pickle Lake Detachment, in Northwestern Ontario.



In 1991, Tim transferred back to the old Tillsonburg OPP Detachment and when the OPP reorganized its detachments he was assigned to the Elgin County OPP Detachment. From there Tim moved on to the Western Region Crime Support Unit where he worked on Project Snow White, an extensive drug investigation involving the Hell's Angels.

In 2003 Tim was promoted to Detective Sergeant and was assigned to the First Nations Policing Bureau working with the Nishnawbe-Aski Police Service, flying in to remote reserves in Northern Ontario to assist with criminal investigations.

In 2005 he took over the OPP Rural & Agriculture Crime Team based in Western Region. The following year he was promoted to Staff Sergeant serving at the Norfolk OPP and the OPP West Region Drug Enforcement Section before returning to Oxford County in July 2008.

Tim has worked in many locations in the Province gaining valuable work experience and knowledge which now proves to be an important asset to our community. He has, however, always been drawn back to "home" and has always maintained a close relationship with his roots here in Oxford County. Tim has found East Zorra-Tavistock Township to be a friendly, welcoming community and he looks forward to continuing to work with the citizens, service organizations and Municipal Officials for the safety and betterment of our community.
